The Burnaby Writers' Society newsletter for May-June 2008 (6584 Deer Lake Avenue, Burnaby, BC V5G 3J7). For some years Eileen Kernaghan and I have occasionally copied or given each other market news of mutual interest. You may particularly be interested in the SF writers' market news at www.smithwriter.com, compiled by writer Douglas Smith, or you may be interested in the opening of two new markets, Science Fiction Quarterly (a new online magazine at www.sfquarterly.net) and Sword & Sorceress 23 (an anthology soliciting submissions, to be published later this year).

CONduit 18 (Salt Lake City, Utah) sent a progress report; unfortunately I picked up the PR only a week before their convention (May 23-25).

Ethel the Aardvark #135, April-May 2008 (The Melbourne SF Club Inc., PO Box 212, World Trade Centre, Melbourne, Vic. 8005, Australia) now features colour in their cover illustrations. This special edition features recent essential news on UK science fiction, the 2008 Ditmar Award winners, and a farewell to the famous Sir Arthur C. Clarke.

File 770:152, March 2008, the 30th anniversary (Mike Glycer, 705 Valley View Ave., Monrovia, CA 91016, USA), a longstanding English-language fan newszine; in recent years, coming out more or less semiannually. It dawned upon me that much of the fan news here consists of the adventures and misadventures of fans you may or may not have heard of, mostly from (US) congoing or fanzine fandom, often 45 years of age, or older. I define fandom pretty much that way, but it's a surprise to realize it, having heard mostly about every other fan community for the past year or two.

Opuntia 64.5 (April) and 75, May 2008 (Dale Speirs, Box 6830, Calgary, AB T2P 2E7) Dale Speirs may be unique among personalzine publishers. For one thing, he may be the only faneditor in Calgary – certainly the only one I know. For another thing, he was the first one to lay out his zine on half-pages (5.5" high and 8.5" wide), in two-column format. Finally, there's his unique numbering system – whole-numbered issues are "sercon", x.1 issues are reviewzines, x.2 issues are indexes, x.3 issues are apazines, and x.5 issues are perzines. 64.5 is mostly Calgary news plus some letters of comment, which is less self-absorbed than you might think when you realize Calgary is presently an oil boomtown. 65 is mostly an extended article about World War II rationing in Canada, which may be of interest if we face a future of various shortages; we also have a reminder of the fannish World Wide Party

on June 21st (everyone raise a glass at 9 p.m. to hardcopy correspondents around the world), and a short article on SF in South Africa.

Is It Time to Replace the Editor?

Judging from these exchanges with Steve Forty, I think you should look for a new *BCSFAzine* editor soon.

Steve 40, April 28, 2008 (responding to mention in last *BCSFAzine*):

Garth if you want to reply rudely to my comment, do it where it was originally put, in the group. I did not make my comment in *BCSFAzine* and it does not belong their [sic] without my permission. My point was that over time FRED became a much more narrow focus, which is why so many left. Their interests weren't piqued. I got tired of so much focus on media. You missed the point as you often do, but you can't try for clarification (I do not always use the best English to try and say something) but I do not try and make the person feel bad when some thing does not quite come out right. The reason I stopped doing the directory was your doing. You don't always listen either. I asked you way back when to put the information form in with *BCSFAzine*, you came out with the newsletter early so

it didn't get in (I had already copied the form and had it at FRED when you came out with the newsletter early). You put your version of the form in BCSFAzine and sent it out. I got about 3 responses (as I knew I would) so I decided not to bother since you wouldn't listen. People will mail a loose form back but they will not detach a form from inside a newsletter. I didn't want email (it meant I had to print them and then sort them-but I would take them I just preferred the mail back form) as that was harder to do than the paper form (remember I always had done it manually through a program set up on my Atari Computer, I only had to do updates for new addresses and could print the rest easily-I even used to phone most members to try and get them to rejoin as well as get their ok to put their info in the directory). The form was set up in a certain way so that I went through the form in order of layout and put the info in the directory database I used. Even e-mailers gave the information back in the order it was requested so it wasn't too hard to put into the database. I also specified two lines of certain information so as not to get a book on one person. None of that was properly set up in the form you sent out. Almost any time you reply to me it is sarcastic and seems to want to offend me. Reply with a little more tact and you will get a lot more out of people, be rude and you will not get much at all. I had no trouble getting stuff for BCSFAzine based on trying to make people happy that they contributed, you should try it too. I have done a lot less with the group the last few years because I got tired of some of the confrontational people I ran into, there were a lot of good people as well, but some were always negative toward me and I felt it and stopped coming. The last FRED I went to at VCON was very

good and the people were nice, so I do plan to go occasionally.

Garth's response:

But I *wasn't* being rude to you.

"I did not make my comment in BCSFAzine and it does not belong their [sic] without my permission."

First I heard of it. When did these copyright restrictions start to apply?

"My point was that over time FRED became a much more narrow focus, which is why so many left. Their interests weren't piqued. I got tired of so much focus on media."

Fine, OK, that's your point. Not the point Ryan raised, though.

"You missed the point as you often do, but you can't try for clarification (I do not always use the best English to try and say something) but I do not try and make the person feel bad when some thing does not quite come out right."

You've got sand, telling me I missed the point.

"The reason I stopped doing the directory was your doing."

Like hell. I did a directory because it was a while since you'd done a directory. This is a functioning anarchism, here. Anybody can take any initiative at

any time. It had been a while since you did, so I relieved a need I felt (and no one else felt), and a fat lot of difference it made.

"You don't always listen either. I asked you way back when to put the information form in with BCSFAzine, you came out with the newsletter early so it didn't get in (I had already copied the form and had it at FRED when you came out with the newsletter early). Excuse me, how was this not listening? This was my *not remembering where I put your form*, obviously.

You also wrote:

As for your putting stuff in BCSFAzine, it is not good etiquette to lift stuff from forums and put them in Newsletters without asking permission. I had told you at the time I was bringing in the form and that I was printing it up for that FRED. You came out early with the form already inside the newsletter. At that point I decided to not bother with the directory any more. I went to a lot of effort and I had told you the form was coming at that FRED and you ignored it and I had told you I wanted the form in that way. I never bothered doing it again. ?you've got sand telling me I missed the point??? What does that mean? Garth we are from two different worlds which don't seem to intersect at very many points.

The Self-Appointed Fannish Elite

Well, yes, I live in a different world. I am looking for a different fandom than this, and I should form my own kind of fan group. The Royal Swiss Navy will reveal its true colours: the SELF APPOINTED FANNISH ELITE.

On the one hand, I would like to talk with people who *actually* communicate. franchises that trade in the same tropes over and over, recycling 1930s Golden Age SF in the 2000s. S.A.F.E. is for the kind of people who use words like “deprecate”, and even get picky about when to say its and it’s, or they’re, there and their.

On the other hand, I have been cold-shouldered in the past by the cliques that have occasionally formed in BCSFA; so I might as well form my own, and stop bothering you.

If *BCSFAzine* goes entirely on-line but members can still pay cash up front for hard copies, I’d be willing to pay for my printout, as long as it came properly bound and not as a stack of 8½×11-inch pages stapled.

People besides Garth have seen the tradezines, Graeme. Garth shows them around at both his and Kathleen’s gatherings. You should come to them more often, and see for yourself. I’d be shy about reviewing someone else’s zine, and might not have much to say about it besides “I like/don’t like the font(s),” but as a group we could record our impressions, as the Scooby-Doo-character-code-named reviewers did in *Zine of Zines*.

Letters - Warren M. Buff: Garth, what do you consider “contemporary zines,” and what don’t you get about them?

Warren - sercon isn’t fannish?

((Each of your questions illustrates the same principle.

((Sercon was originally short for “serious and constructive.” Fanzines, the focus of Corflu, I tend to identify with fannish fandom, which was everything frivolous and not sercon.

((There’s little reason Warren would know about sercon fandom; at present only Graeme, as far as I know, keeps the fanhistory flame alive.

((The kind of fanzine I know about is the kind of fannish zine I saw in the early 1980s ... usually products of a widely-dispersed SF hobby group in the 1970s, who were unabashed amateurs at writing, drawing, editing, layout and mimeo production.

((The contemporary kinds of zines that Broken Pencil reviews are entirely different; they're about independent music, independent personal journalism, poetry, politics, sexuality, sexual politics, sexual poetry, political journalism, independent comics, and for all I know sexual comics, too; and there's no reason the editors or readers would know about, or comprehend, fanzines in the SF, fannish world.

((The bottom line is that people grasp pretty much only what they absorbed in a short, receptive period; and nobody gets exposed to more than a random 5% - or less - of our accumulated popular culture.))

- Lloyd Penney: Well then, fuck you too, *Broken Pencil!*

On VCON Scheduling and Advertisement: I also prefer not to use a credit card or pay for things on-line.

Hal Duncan's Taxonomy of Strange Fiction: Interesting article! I prefer settings that are more urban and civilized, but that can include not only the 20th century and the standard flying-car future, but also Victorian and post-post-apocalyptic settings (which could include *Star Trek*, now that I think of it). I'm bored by stories that don't take place in a civilized, urban world, so I've got no reason to root for the *status quo* when a story is about preserving an idyllic, rural way of life, and no post-apocalyptic wildernesses or barbarian fantasy for me, thanks. I also dislike anti-utopian stories where the moral is that life shouldn't be perfect (or easy). Sadly, that seems to be the only way writers are capable of reacting to the ideal of utopia.

((I wasn't aware that Utopia was an ideal.))

Would *Shadowrun* be in the "Modern Archaic World" category?

I Believe in Harvey Dent: Argh! The part about past actors who played Dent is duplicated. Remind me to re-proofread the article after it's been pasted into *BCSFazine* the next time.

((I should have proofread it better myself. Also, I should have proofread it better. Wait a minute, I just said that. I just said that, didn't I? ...))

Not Necessarily the Media File: I don't like any of those things! I wonder how far back in the *BCSFazine* archives I'd have to go to find a "Media File" that talks about movies and shows old enough for my tastes.

((Me, I define science fiction as books, or short stories, words on paper; I don't expect much from TV or film versions of SF. I define conventions as one of the few places I can enjoy socializing, and not often even at conventions, anymore.))

Letters - Taral Wayne: *“Can't say I cared whether or not there was a Harvey Dent website as part of promoting the next Batman fiasco.”* In that case, can't say I cared whether or not there was a funny animal vagina—*“And the cover was nifty.”*—but on the other hand...

- Felicity Walker: *“((Any point in my printing copies of BCSFAzine anymore, then?))”* Sure there is: I want a print copy. You can make reservations by going to the web site <http://www.snoqualmiesummitlodge.com/groups/> and using the group code ConComCon. Room rates are \$89 for a deluxe double room with microwave and a small refrigerator.

For those of you that would be coming in from out of the PacificNorthwest. We'd recommend flying into Sea-Tac Airport. Snoqualmie Pass is about an hour drive east from thereon I-90. This is a regional convention with most of the Northwest cons being represented, but people from out of the area also attend.

This year's theme is "Learning from Each Other or How Not to Reinvent the Wheel". This will be the fifteenth year of C-Cubed!



News

OUR PRESIDENT MUGGED NEAR HIS HOME

In early May 2008 at about 9 p.m., R. Graeme Cameron was assaulted and robbed. Graeme relates:

I live 3 blocks from a Safeway & decided to go shopping at 9:00 pm, on foot since I don't drive. The thug must have targeted me as an easy mark, an older guy with arms full of groceries taking a shortcut across a parking lot in the dark. He must have scooted along the sidewalk timing his appearance from behind a Skytrain pillar just perfectly.

Didn't know I was in trouble till I saw a fist out of the corner of my eye. Slammed the side of my head and knocked me to the ground. Felt like an electric shock. Then he was kicking my head. I struggled to my knees and tried to punch him in the stomach a couple

of times, but I was so dazed it was like punching underwater, slow and useless.

Meanwhile he's leaning over me pounding both sides of my head with his fists. I lean back to avoid that and he punches me between the eyes and knocks me on my back again. Then more kicks to the head and chest.

I suddenly realize he hasn't asked for or demanded anything. All he is doing is beating me while screaming "Fuck you! Fuck you!" over and over. For all I knew all he wanted to do was kill me. So I shouted "Take whatever you want!"

"Gimme your wallet."

I gave it to him.

"Don't move or I'll fuckin kill you." Calmly puts my wallet in his pants pocket and walks slowly toward the nearby skytrain station.

I get to my knees and gather my groceries. Figure I have to get away quick before he discovers there's no money in the wallet, and no credit card. All he as stolen is my ID & bank debit card. All his hard work for nothing! He might get \$10 selling the ID to an identity theft gang.

The fact that people were passing by on the sidewalk while all this was happening, and that no one said or did anything even after the thug had left and I'm struggling to get up with my face covered in blood, is disappointing, but I figured everything would be ok once I got home. Asked my wife to call 911 as I staggered through the door.

Upshot is my head must be thicker and denser than even my boss thinks. Despite my taking at least a dozen blows and kicks directly to the head and face, the doctor at the hospital was unable to pry my skull apart, thus indicating it was still holding together. My

glasses protected my nose and eye sockets it seems. They gave me a tetanus shot because of the dirt mashed into my face and told me to go home and take Tylenol (but not aspirin! Do not take a blood thinner after blows to the head! Makes it too easy to bleed inside the skull and puts potentially fatal pressure on the brain).

Spent a week with a raging headache throbbing simultaneously from assorted areas of my head and various types of chest pain while sporting a chevron shaped shiner under my right eye and a huge scab on my nose. My doctor confirmed I have bruised ribs, a bruised cheekbone, and soft tissue damage. "It'll stop hurting when it stops hurting."

Graeme offers some lessons he thinks we can take from this. (Be aware that you these aren't carved in stone):

First, many modern muggers assault first, rob later. Offer your wallet/purse as quickly as possible. It'll save you some pain, maybe your life.

Second, don't fight back. He's done this before. He's done it often. He doesn't care whether he hurts you or not. If you fight back he'll escalate the beating to the next level. All he wants is your wallet/purse. Give it to him.

Third, don't carry official ID or finance cards unless you know you're going to use or need them. Cause if you're robbed, you lose them. And without ID it's almost impossible to get ID. Fortunately I still have my birth certificate, wedding certificate, and employer photo ID card. Otherwise I'd be screwed.

Fourth, don't take shortcuts if there are any likely ambush sites. Stay in the open. At least you might be able to see trouble coming.

Fifth, don't go out after dark. Not worth the risk.

Sixth, always carry money. It'll make your attacker happy and prevent him from punishing you for not having anything worth stealing.

Meanwhile, if 10 years from now CSIS breaks down the door and arrests me as the greatest serial killer/terrorist/mastermind criminal in the world I'll know someone's been using my identity. Oh well, nothing I can do about that.

Ben Stein: 'Science Leads to Killing People'
