



News-Like Matter

Notes from April BCSFA Meeting

In attendance were Kathleen Moore (host/treasurer), Felicity Walker (editor), Michael “Fruvous” Bertrand, Julian Castle, Joe Devoy, Amos Iu, Ray Seredin, and Arlen Moore. Stewart Smyth phoned to say he couldn’t make it.

Kathleen made her special brownie-like dessert that isn’t brownies, but rather a sort of brown cake. (She says it could be called “cockeyed cake” or “wacky cake.”)

Ray relayed hellos from Susan & Michael Walsh. Ray had just come back from the BC NDP¹ leadership convention. Adrian Dix won. Ray was surprised that 85% of the people at the convention were white. We talked about whether this was an accurate cross-section of the party, or just the people who go to political conventions.

Kathleen said something about the government charging HST² on marijuana, unless it’s for medical uses. I couldn’t understand how this would be done, since non-medical marijuana is illegal, and to pay tax on it would be to admit to having it. Ray pointed out that if Canada legalizes marijuana, Americans would come here to buy it, which would bring in money.

This reminded Amos that he likes prohibition-era history and fiction and is reading *Public Enemies: America’s Greatest Crime Wave and the Birth of the FBI, 1933–34* by Bryan Burrough [the book on which the movie *Public Enemies* (2009) was based].

Kathleen showed “Radioactive Communist Chernobyl Chipmunk,” an original 1987 pen and ink drawing by Marc Holmes. She said it referenced things like *Samurai Penguin* (a 1986 independent black-and-white comic series which apparently ran for eight issues, though the only one you will ever find is issue three). (*Samurai Penguin* was also Random Nostalgia in [BCSFAzine #443](#).)

I remembered there being a lot of Amtrak jokes in the 1980s, and that these jokes were hauled out again when Senator Joe Biden—who gladly used Amtrak to commute 250 miles to the Senate every day from his home in Delaware—became Vice President.

Kathleen brought out issues three to five of her zine *Why You Got This Zine* and we reread them. She explained some of the more obscure references.

Footnotes for international readers:

1. *British Columbia New Democratic Party*.

2. *Harmonized Sales Tax, introduced in 2010, which combined the GST (Goods and Services Tax, added in 1991 by Prime Minister Brian Mulroney) and PST (Provincial Sales Tax). Items that were previously only taxed with GST now cost more. On Friday 24 June 2011, BC will have a referendum on whether to keep the HST or go back to the separate GST and PST.*

Seth MacFarlane to Reboot ‘The Flintstones’

Kevin Reilly, the President of Entertainment for Fox Broadcasting Company, announced today that 20th Century Fox Television and Warner Bros. Television have joined to produce a new *Flintstones* prime-time animated sitcom. The reboot will be executive-produced by Dan Palladino, Kara Vallow, and Seth MacFarlane, who jokes, “I think America is finally ready for an animated sitcom about a fat stupid guy with a wife who’s too good for him.”

The series will air on Fox in Fall 2013.

MacFarlane says that the characters will look the same as before, but the stone-age-technology comedy will be updated: “What is the animal version of an iPad?” (An iPaw?)

“Taken at the Flood”: Reviews movie *Tidal Wave* (2009), *Man from UNCLE* episode “The Yo Ho Ho and a Bottle of Rum Affair” (1967), movie *Killer Wave* (2006), and TV movie *Flood* (2009). Dale points out that tsunamis are “often mistakenly called a tidal wave” (they’re caused by earthquakes and not tidal forces). Coincidentally, just before I received this zine, I had been wondering why we never hear the term “tidal wave” anymore. Now I know. Future “Random Nostalgia.”
