





News-Like Matter

Notes from November 2015 BCSFA Meeting

In attendance were Graeme Cameron (chairman/archivist), Barb Dryer (secretary), Kathleen Moore (treasurer), Ray Seredin (host), Felicity Walker (editor), Michael "Fruvous" Bertrand, Julian Castle, Joe Devoy, William Graham, and Teresa Spanics.

The December meeting/dinner will be at ABC Country Restaurant, Richmond, on the third Sunday (Sunday 20 December 2015), at 6 PM.



Topic: movies with political buildings blowing up. I remembered the White House in *Independence Day* (1996), Fru brought up *Mars Attacks* (1996), and Ray mentioned the Royal Canadian Air Farce's parody of *Meteor* (1979), with Parliament being destroyed. Fru said the White House explosion in *Independence Day* shows America's complex relationship with authority. Also: very visual. I remembered that it wasn't computer animation; they built a model and blew it up for real. Teresa added that it took a month to set up and they had to get it right the first time. This reminded Graeme of low-budget movies where the effect didn't or couldn't get filmed, and so they had to cut away to a shot of the characters reacting, then cut back to burning rubble.

The Auroras will be handed out tonight! Ray said that John Herbert has three Aurora Awards. His cats took them over when they were kittens, curling up in the "S" and "F." Now they're too big to fit in them.

Graeme said that at first, he was against removing HP Lovecraft as the bust for the World Fantasy Award, but it's become more evident that Lovecraft was *very* racist, so he agrees. However he still remains a Lovecraft fan, viewing Lovecraft's insane racism as a mental disorder afflicting an otherwise rational and decent man who wrote wonderful tales.



Topic: the All Star Wrestling event I'd attended where there was a masked, camouflage-fatigued tag-team called Pain and Suffering. When they were defeated in the rumble, the announcer said "Pain and Suffering have been eliminated!" which sounded really nice. This reminded Graeme of pro-wrestler Mike Jones's interview with Larry Wilmore on *The Nightly Show*. Jones's WWF character, Virgil, was "The Million Dollar Man" Ted DiBiase's servant. Wilmore said "You'd play a slave for a buck?" and Jones replied "Try \$100,000!"

Fru said that George Bush (Senior) said that Dick Cheney is a traitor to the Bush family. He acted at first like he didn't have his own agenda, but under George Bush (Junior) he had a definite agenda. I misheard Joe say "And that's how American inherited the Wyrms."

Graeme said that Charles de Gaulle pulled France out of Algiers. The Algerian French were mad at France and planned to parachute into Paris to assassinate de Gaulle. Joe said that *The Day of the Jackal* (1973) is set during that. I said "The original, not the remake with Bruce Willis."⁶ Joe said "Ugh." I vaguely remembered that the original had an actor from James Bond movies in it. Joe said that Michael Lonsdale, "Hugo Drax" in *Moonraker* (1979), played the police inspector chasing the Jackal, played by Edward Fox, who was "M" in *Never Say Never Again* (1983), the "non-Eon"⁷ James Bond movie. So *The Day of the Jackal* has two Bond connections.

Graeme finds that he's not as interested in new movies anymore. He's curious about the new *Star Wars* but can wait for it to be on Turner Classic Movies...in 2050. I find the same thing, except that my era is 1970s–1990s while Graeme's is 1930s–1950s. Back when I liked new things more often, I used to read *Starlog* every month and look forward every upcoming genre movie. For Graeme, it


was *Cinefantastique*. Teresa liked *Omni*. I liked *Omni* too. Ray said that there was an *Omni* TV show which was, "ironically, sponsored by Amtrak." Ray added that most Americans don't want to leave their car in the garage and take a train, but that might change; they might want to now. I replied, "Not if it's a bus on rails. If it's the good kind of train where at most four people share compartments with beds and sofas, then yes."

Graeme will be the chair of VCON 41, and the theme will be "Puppets, Muppets, and Marionation." I suggested Charles Band as a topic (if not a guest), since

many of his films are about puppets and/or dolls and/or prominently use miniatures, including the *Puppet Master* (1989), *Demonic Toys* (1992), and *Ghoulies* (1985) series.⁸ Joe thought that it could be a good panel topic. For T-shirt art, Ray suggested a drawing of the Robotter piloting a *Thunderbirds* vehicle. This reminded Graeme that Jamie Anderson (Gerry Anderson’s son) didn’t like *Thunderbirds* (2004), the live-action/CGI remake, saying that it needed strings holding up the vehicles. I mentioned the wrongness of that classist scene in *Thunderbirds Are Go* (1966) and wondered if it was related to the same cultural shift that had 1970s hippies not liking *Doctor Who*’s Third Doctor being an authority figure. Ray pointed out that the Third Doctor had his own clashes with authority figures and hated the military. That reminded me of “Doctor Who and the Silurians” (1972), when the Silurians were going to exterminate the human race and the Brigadier had to destroy them first, and the Doctor got all preachy about it—convenient, since *he* didn’t have to do it. Fru said there are people who can’t accept utilitarianism—that sometimes there are no good options and it’s them or us. (That was also the episode with the weird avant-garde soundtrack, which was cool in the episode but irritating in the DVD menu, since it made a harsh “*Beep beep beep boop booooooop!!!*” sound every time a screen loaded.)

'Polar Borealis' Magazine Coming in 2017

R. Graeme Cameron writes:

"After an inspiring luncheon conversation with Lynda Williams, President of SF Canada, I've decided to launch a semi-pro SF fiction magazine circa January/February 2017 to be titled '*Polar Borealis*.' Semi-pro because it will pay less than SFWA rates, but at 1 cent a word (for stories 3,000 words or less) it will still be a paying market.

"I intend to pay contributors on acceptance prior to publication, at least once I have my finances in order circa 2017. Contributors in 2016 will be paid on 'when funds available' basis. I have already put together a 'proof of concept' first issue, which is closed, but am currently open (for the second proposed issue) to story submissions, poetry submissions and art submissions.

"What will make the zine unique is that I want at least two to three stories per issue to be first sales for beginning authors. Consequently unpublished writers submitting stories will only be in competition with each other and not with pros.

"How am I going to pull this off? I have a clever business plan...Going to be different, that's for sure.

"What and Why

"The primary purpose of this zine is to encourage beginning writers in a given issue of *Polar Borealis*, and make it available online to anyone who wants to read it for however long I choose to host said issue.

"Availability: The first 'regular' issue is planned for January/February 2017. *Polar Borealis* will be free to anyone who wishes to download it or receive it via e-mail subscription. At no time will any reader be charged in any way. *Polar Borealis* is 100% free, and in that sense is of amateur status. The only reason it can also be classified as semi-pro is the fact that all contributors will be paid.

“Submission Guidelines

“Who can submit: Contributors must be Canadian, or at least resident in Canada. Any Canadian (must be Canadian—going to be a narrow-niche kind of zine) short story writer, poet, or artist. Stories by authors not yet published will *absolutely* be considered. I want to publish at least one or two per issue, maybe more. But it would also be nice to publish stories from experienced professionals to serve as inspirational examples of what to aspire to.

“When to submit: First issue submissions closed (publication imminent) but am currently open to submissions for proposed second issue.

“How and where to submit: Send an MS Word document (not a PDF) to rgraeme@shaw.ca and be sure to include ‘PB Sub’ in the e-mail heading.

“Everyone submitting should include a short, one-paragraph bio which confirms Canadian status, publication status, and makes you appear quite the character.

“Include info: Are you still waiting for your first sale? Or have already been published? People submitting MS. should indicate whether they’ve never been published or mention a couple of things already published so that I will know what’s what.

“Genre requirements: Short stories can range from hard science to whimsical to Lovecraftian. Looking for science fiction and not fantasy, though of course SF can include fantasy elements, so I’m flexible. Surprise me. Nothing obscene or ultra-violent. Idea-driven combined with character-driven would be ideal.

“Particularly interested in beginning writers who haven’t made a sale yet. I welcome experienced authors but will judge unpublished writers as a separate category so they won’t have to compete with pros. Ideally at least two to three first-sale stories will be in in every issue. Be sure to mention whether you have been published or not so I’ll be sure to place you in the proper category.

“Pay rates—payment on acceptance—preferably by PayPal—for non-exclusive online periodical rights:

- Short stories, one cent a word.

- \$10 for one thousand words or less.

- \$20 for two thousand words or less (but reasonably above one thousand).

- \$30 for three thousand words or less (but reasonably above two thousand).

“Not interested in any story over three thousand words in length.

“Poems: Currently open to poem submissions as well. Payment (regardless of length): \$10.

“Art: Currently open to art submissions including cover art (which can be colour, but I’m also interested in black & white line illustration with maybe a bit of shading (so not too time-consuming for artists to create): \$40. Interior art (B&W line illustration) to illustrate a given story (solicited only): \$20. Interior art (B&W line illustration) fillo: \$5.

“I buy first publication (or reprint) English language world online (PDF) internet rights. Period of exclusivity lasts till one week after publication, whereupon contributor is free to sell it anywhere else they like whenever they like, be it in print form, audio, visual, cuneiform mud bricks, touchy-feely 4D, or whatever. In other words, I don’t want to hinder the authors or artists from earning further income or distributing their creation as widely as possible.

“Be aware that normally, contributors will be paid on acceptance prior to being published. I am not yet in a position to do that. Consequently the 2016 issues (two or three) will come out as soon as they are ready, but contributors will not be paid till late in the year (though earlier if possible). 2017 issues will not come out until after the contributors have been paid.”

Ditto 2017: R. Graeme Cameron plans to revive Ditto, the dormant fanzine fans’ convention, in the Vancouver area in the fall of 2017 (probably October 6–8), basically because Taral Wayne dared him to. Graeme writes:

His nominators from the West were John Gannon, Jaymz Smith, and Elizabeth Keeling-Carreau, from the East, Diane Lacey, Krikor Ajeman, and Alan Bowbrick. Carreau won the race by acclamation.”




Therefore, the first panel I made it to was at:

And parties have a minimum volume directly proportional to the number of attendees, so while we tried to be quiet in response to a noise complaint, it just wasn't happening, even after the second complaint.

So we were booted out of that room, and had to find another. At this point, the majority of partygoers simply gave up and went to bed. But some kind and swift-thinking con staff were able to sneak us into a conference room that had one of my favorite things to see at a party, a big huge round table.



Thus began one epic and well populated game of Cards Against Humanity. At maximum, we had 14 people playing. The game is designed to manufacture hilarity, so despite the fact that it was materially the worst Dead Dog Party I have ever been to in my many years of VCON-going, I had a wonderful time and didn't end up going to bed till 4:30 AM, all laughed out.

And thus ends another wonderful, magical, marvelous VCON. I had a grand old time, as I always do, and I can't wait till I get to do it all over again in 2016.
