

Graeme told Fruvous "Your story will appear in *Polar Borealis* #2." 4

SF Canada told Graeme "You're probably getting a lot of submissions from our members because we've been talking about you."

ing original are slim. However Graeme likes these sort of stories, and in this case the author was a scientist who had come up with a fresh take on it.

VCON 37 Thoughts, Part 2
