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FUTURIAN SOCIETY SUSPENDED!! The scene at the eighteenth meeting of the Futurian Society of Sydney would have given any outsider the impression of absolute boredom. For the faces of the members showed nothing but disinterestedness and some even appeared to be asleep! And it was not for no reason at all that this attitude was adopted. The plain facts of the matter amounted to this: During the last few months the Society has been aimless! Most proposals have been squelched, and, even with the change in the Executive Committee, there has been nothing to keep members interested. As a result everyone is fed up.

When David R. Evans became Director he asserted that he would use some form of dictatorial power on the FSS. He has attempted to apply these powers but, quite evidently, the members do not like them. This, added to already general disinterest, has been more or less responsible for a drift. Vol Molesworth showed that that he was fed up by walking out on the position of Secretary. During the proceedings at the eighteenth meeting Bert F. Castellari proposed that the Society be dissolved. William D. Veney promptly stated that it was not actually dissolution that was necessary and proposed suspension for a short period. Castellari agreed to the amendment and later in the evening the motion was carried. The Futurian Society will not meet again until its First Anniversary meeting in November.

The editors of this publication will print the following statements which they feel should be made public: The members' ages in the Futurian Society range from 16 years to 18 years, some going on for 19 years. They have been acquainted with adult science fiction fans and have got on well with them. However, none of these adults have had the time to join and take part in the activities of the Futurian Society though many have wished they could. The first adult member in the Futurian Society was David R. Evans. When with other adult fans we have felt more or less as their equals and have been treated as such. David R. Evans, we are sorry to say, has treated us as his inferiors! We realise, of course, that Evans has seen much more of life and world than have we. But when he entered the Futurian Society and treated us like this he took the wrong attitude, and we therefore took the wrong attitude towards him!
